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
Additional Information

Registration: Unless noted otherwise, all courses are open to chaplains, chaplain candidates, and chaplain assistants. All prospective students must register for a course with the DPMT **before** doing so in ATRRS. Registration information is available on the website.

Lodging/Travel: Due to distances between lodging facilities, Fort Sam Houston, and other learning environments, students are encouraged to rent a car. Lodging reservation information is provided to students once their registration has been confirmed.

Physical Training: Students must meet Army APFT standards or Service Branch equivalent. Physical training is the responsibility of each student during course attendance.

DPMT Functional Courses

Combat Medical Ministry (For All Chaplains)

Emergency Medical Ministry (Chaplain Assistants Only)

Course Numbers: 5G-CMM-7S (Chaplains);
5G-F9/561-F9 (Chaplain assistants)

Dates (2013): 14-26 Oct, 2-14 Dec (2012)
27 Jan - 8 Feb, 7 - 19 Apr, 5-17 May
14- 26 Jul, 15- 27 Sep

Combat Medical Ministry and Emergency Medical Ministry are combined courses involving two-weeks of intensive training to prepare UMTs for the rigors, wounds, and stress associated with the combat and medical environments.



CMM is for chaplains and EMM is for assistants, but the courses run concurrently to allow UMTs to practice their new skills together. In addition to the classroom learning, students spend approximately 25 hours in a Trauma 1 facility responding to trauma alerts and interacting with Wounded Warriors.

The lessons prepare UMT members to address the trauma, crisis, grief, death, spiritual health, and other ministerial concerns that arise in a Combat Support Hospital (CSH) or Combat and Operational Stress Control (COSC) Detachment and is designed to prepare UMTs for medical ministry associated with deployment.

Chaplain assistants receive additional instruction in peer caregiving and conducting spiritual assessments.

Chaplains can earn their 7S additional skill identifier when the CMM course is combined with one unit of CPE. Chaplain assistants earn the 1M skill identifier.

Target Group: Priority is given to chaplains/assistants due to deploy or who are assigned to CSH or COSC detachments. This course is **required** for all MEDCOM chaplain assistants. UMTs are encouraged to enroll as a team.

Note: A mandatory orientation is held at 1800 the Sunday before the first class. Students are required to complete approximately two hours of online training and a pre-assessment before attending the course.

Professional Graduate Short Courses*

Medical Ministry Supervision Course

Course Number: 6H-300/A0816
Dates: 3-7 June

This course provides Chaplains with the knowledge and skills associated with Clinical Pastoral Education Supervision. As a result of this course, Chaplains will be capable of pastoral supervision at the senior levels of MEDCOM. Chaplains completing the course will be able to apply for the Supervisor Education Student (SES) program.

Note: Chaplain must have a 7R ASI.



Medical Ministry Spiritual Health

Course Number: 6H-300/A0801
Dates: 24- 28 June

The Combat Operational Environment taxes the spiritual health of UMT members potentially overwhelming their ability to respond to trauma and crises of Soldiers. This course assists chaplains and assistants in developing, reinforcing, and safeguarding their personal faith and spiritual growth so that they can more ably respond to the crises



Professional Graduate Short Courses*

Medical Ministry Substance Abuse

Course Number: 6H-300/A0804

Dates: 4 - 8 Mar

Substance abuse is an ongoing problem as Soldiers try to cope with multiple deployments, stress, and personal crises. Often, Unit Ministry Teams must provide support to troops to mitigate the effects of substance abuse problems, to help Soldiers get the help they need, and to fortify Soldiers spiritually so they can resist turning to this form of self-medication.

In this course, students learn about addiction, its spiritual aspects, and the medical, developmental, social, and cultural issues that assist in recovery.

Medical Ministry Spiritual Resiliency Course

Course Number: N/A

Dates: 12-16 Aug

This course explores the foundational theory of trauma from spiritual, psychological, and physiological approaches with special emphasis on spiritual trauma, post-traumatic soul wounding, and pastoral approaches to trauma. Attendees also learn a variety of pastoral approaches to the implement self-care and a stress-preventative rule of life for preservation of personal and operational effectiveness.

- *All MEDCOM chaplains must complete a professional short course annually.*
